I was taken back a bit when someone asked me to autograph their program but after 15-20 others followed during the 15-day competition I thought it was pretty cool and of course all the players were more than willing to oblige. There were even some players who collected signatures from opposing teams. It was definitely an honor to play before so many spectators, some who were there for eight hours a day every day. While practicing the day before the competition began I walked over to a couple to inquire

I had not noticed the couple had relocated but after about two hours they returned with a small sack from a nearby store. The atmosphere of these cookouts was awesomely laidback and pleasantly unguarded and shoes were definitely not required.
